### Executive: Public sector crucial to 5G networks

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Public sector service providers Sprint, Verizon and AT&T are addressing about 50 members, government staffers and industry members on ways that improved public connectivity can benefit consumers, and how cities are working with telecom companies to make this a reality. The meeting was part of the 2017 Conference of Mayors in Miami Beach.

Conflicts between government and the private sector is key to building on the new fiber public 5G network. Once that occurs, data download speeds may be 10 to 1,000 times faster than their current rates.

## Who's exempt from travel ban? Decision raises new question

■ The Supreme Court decided Monday to allow parts of Trump's 90-day travel ban to go into effect and will hear oral arguments on the case in October.

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WASHINGTON — The U.S. Supreme Court's decision to only partially lift an injunction against President Donald Trump's travel ban is likely to create a nightmare scenario for border officials and lower courts, as federal officials struggle to decide who should and shouldn't be allowed to enter the United States.

Both proponents and opponents of Trump's temporary travel ban against six majority-Muslim countries expect more lawsuits this summer to define what it means to have a "bona fide relationship" with someone or some group in the United States.

The Supreme Court decided Monday to allow parts of Trump's 90-day travel ban to go into effect and will hear oral arguments on the case in October. But the court will allow

people from the six designated countries — Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen — to enter the U.S. if they can prove they have a "bona fide relationship" with any person or entity in the United States.

In its 13-page decision, the court gave several examples of what it considers an appropriate bona fide relationship. They include a foreign national who wishes to visit a spouse or someone with a "close familial relationship"; a student who has been admitted by a university; a lecturer who has been

## 22 million more would lose health coverage by 2026, says CBO

■ The nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office says that under the Senate bill to repeal the Affordable Care Act, the number of uninsured would be only slightly lower than under the bill proposed in the House.

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WASHINGTON — The road to passage for the Senate Republican healthcare bill got a little steeper on Monday after the Congressional Budget Office determined the estimated draft legislation would cause 22 million people to lose health coverage by 2026.

The legislation would cause 15 million more people to lose coverage in 2018, and Medicaid enrollment would fall by 16 percent by 2026 under the proposal. In all, 49 million Americans would lack health coverage under the legislation in 2026, compared with 29 million under current law.

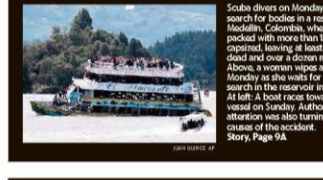
The increase would be disproportionately larger among older people with lower income — particularly people between 50 and 64 years old with income of less than 200 percent of the federal poverty level, the report found.

The bill would save the government \$21 billion over 10 years, mainly by cutting Medicaid spending by \$77 billion or 26 percent over 10 years, leading to 15 million fewer enrollees, the CBO estimated.

The disappearing numbers could complicate an already difficult task for Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, who needs 50 senators to vote for the widely criticized legislation to pass the upper chamber in a possible vote later this week.
